- 2. Toby admits he doesn't have a great relationship with his dad. What's your relationship with your dad like? How would you describe his strengths and weaknesses?
- 3. Do you have someone in your life who protects you, like Cliff's cousin Steven did? How do they help you?
- 4. Joshua says that listening to someone is one way to show you care about them (page 10-11). How well do you listen to others? What are some ways you can become a better listener?
- 5. In Chapter 2, everyone shares their favorite memories of Kerry. What stories do you think your friends and family would tell about you? What memories do you have of your friends that always make you smile?
- 6. In Chapter 3, BB and Sammy see something they can only describe as a miracle. Have you ever seen something so unusual that you couldn't explain why or how it happened? Try to explain it now.
- 7. How often do you think about God? What words would you use to describe Him? What kinds of challenges can God help you through?
